Log Cabins and Archaeology?

Marking short leaf pine logs, removing bark, "juggling," hewing, adzing, notching...what do any of these things have to do with archaeology?

In February, **Dr. Eric Larsen** spent a few days at Montpelier—just down the road from Germanna in Orange County—as a participant in a Log Cabin Workshop. It was a very cold week, but Eric kept warm swinging axes and moving 12 to 14 foot logs. Over the course of the workshop, the group of 16 turned a pile of freshly cut pine logs into a log cabin.

Why, you might ask, is an archaeologist spending his time building a cabin? Two years ago, Montpelier archaeologists were excavating what

was the site of a field slave quarter. A subground storage pit was found along with soils stained from the heat of a hearth. With these bits of evidence, archaeologists were able to determine that this was once

the site of a log structure. With the excavations completed and the location now known, there still wasn't much for visitors to "see" and understand.

As **Dr. Matt Reeves** put it, "rebuilding the cabin," based on the archaeological evidence, "al-




lows the archaeology to come up out of the ground."

In March, the 12x14 foot log cabin was moved into place on the landscape and is now visible from the Montpelier Visitor

Center parking lot. Now visitors can see the results of the archaeology. At Germanna, we are creating our own archaeology program. Can you imagine something like this in our future?

Why Half-timbered Buildings?



Did you ever wonder why so many houses and other buildings in the Siegen region of Germany were built in the "half-timbered" style? The explanation is contained and beautifully illustrated in the book

Framework Houses, a photography book by **Bernd** and Hilla Becher, published by MIT Press, a volume of which was donated to the Foundation by **J.** Marc Wheat in January.

The reason is a sensible one for this region, one of the oldest iron-producing areas of the world: to preserve wood needed for the charcoal used in producing iron. In fact, this need was mandated in the Siegen area by a 1790 law prohibiting excessive use of wood for house-building. The law prescribed the amount of lumber structurally required and forbade the construction of elements serving only ornamental purposes. It also specified the maximum strength for beams, sills, corner posts, and studs. It was applied to other buildings such as barns, churches, schools, inns, shops, factories, and mining structures.

Field Notes

I attended the 45th Annual Mid Atlantic Archaeology Conference (MAAC) in Ocean City, Maryland in March. On Saturday afternoon of the conference I set up and presented a poster I created for the event entitled "Resuming Archaeology at Germanna: Continuing the Engagement with Virginia's Colonial Frontier at Fort Germanna." The poster session on Public Outreach was well attended. I was also invited to participate in a new workshop, "Archaeological Speed Dating." Over a 75-minute period, Laura Galke (George Washington Foundation at Ferry Farm) and I spoke with more than 40 students about careers in archaeology and heritage tourism sites. The workshop served as a means of creating networks for students negotiating career choices in the field of archaeology. In the end, the workshop was one of the highlights of my conference.

s I write this column, I am preparing to take Amy son Benjamin to Germany (his second time, but his first ex utero!). We will be staying with my Karst sixth cousins in the Rhineland, the Heeren family in Aachen, and after Palm Sunday services at the Nikolaikirche in Siegen we will meet friends and relatives we have come to know through the Germanna Foundation. It will change the trajectory of my son's life.

Recently, I was part of a panel discussion on the U.S. - German bilateral relationship convened by

The McCain Institute for International Leadership at the German-American Heritage Museum in Washington, DC.

Dr. Stefan Buchwald (Director of the German

Information Center USA), Ambassador (Ret.) Edward B. O'Donnel (former U.S. Consul General to Germany), and I responded to the planned initiatives of the McCain Fellows to improve the relationship between our two countries.

I heard what I largely expected to hear on the political, military, and economic aspects, but what quite interested me was the depth of support the two diplomats voiced for innovative people-to-people exchanges between Germans and Americans.

For Americans who have attended Germanna reunions or have traveled with the Foundation to ancestral villages, you know the effect it has on us. But it is also deeply moving for Germans to meet Americans with a 300-year-old immigration

memory!

As evidence, you can download from Germanna.org a broadcast that ARD (the largest German radio and TV network) made about our

visitors' trip to Germanna. The Germanna trip of the German-American Club of Siegen-Wittgenstein is also the subject of a two-page spread in this month's Gazette of the Association of German-American Clubs (VDAC), which you can read on our Facebook page.

The Germans are very interested in our nomination to the World Monuments Fund watch list, and I have recently met with three members of the German parliament (Hermann Groehe, Dr. Edgar Franke, and Rudolf Henke) about its importance to bring increased recognition to the archaeological site of Fort Germanna and the Enchanted Castle. You may have met Volkmar Klein, who represents Siegen-Wittgenstein in Berlin, last year at the reunion; I will be meeting with him about this nomination in his constituency before Easter.

We are at a unique point in Germanna Foundation history with the right people and new technologies coming together to ensure we leave an inspiring legacy for future generations on both sides of the Atlantic. To make that happen, please join with me in making a multi-year commitment to finance the operations of this outstanding foundation.





CHIEF'S REPORT

The Fort Germanna/Enchanted Castle site has been nominated for inclusion on the World Monuments Fund 2016 Watch List.

The Watch List, published every two years, calls international attention to cultural heritage sites around the globe that are at risk from the forces of nature or the impact of social, political, and economic change, and aids in identifying important places with compelling opportunities for positive change.

As the Germanna Foundation re-starts archaeological exploration and interpretation of the Fort Germanna and Enchanted Castle site (listed on the National Register of Historic Places), increasing awareness of the fragile site's significance is our main reason for seeking inclusion on the 2016 Watch List.

The nomination also helps the Foundation prepare to seek Historic Landmark status from the Secretary of the Interior for our properties as recommended by the Virginia Department of Historic Resources.

The Orange County, Virginia, Board of Supervisors endorsed our nomination in a letter to the World Monuments Fund, stating, in part, "Additional awareness of the importance of the Enchanted Castle site will serve to enhance the Foundation's historic preservation and archaeology efforts, as well as the County's long-range development planning activities."

Our Archaeological Management Plan has been completed and submitted to the Virginia Department of Historic Resources (DHR) following review by the Germanna Foundation Council of Advisors including Dr. Bill Kelso and Mr. Frank **Price.** This is an important milestone requirement before continuing archaeological survey and excavation work on the site. The search for Fort Germanna's boundaries begins!

You may have noticed we gave our website, GERMANNA.ORG, a little face-lift in mid-March. The main reason for the change was to make the website more responsive for visitors accessing the site via mobile devices (a phone, tablet, etc.). Our new membership, donation and other online forms also display better in the new template, making them easier to complete.


